


Building a Brighter Future for Mobile's People & Pets

A Case for Support for a New Animal Shelter in Mobile



Overview

The City of Mobile Animal Services (COMAS) is embarking on a mission to build a brighter future for Mobile's people and pets by constructing a modern animal shelter to serve our community. For the past decade, we have been facing a growing animal overpopulation crisis in Mobile. Currently, COMAS takes in nearly 2,000 animals annually in need of shelter, food, and a loving home, and there are still more stray and abandoned animals that need our help every day.

Built in 1967, our current facility makes it challenging to adequately respond to the need. While we are proud of our track record and ability to vaccinate, rehome, and support the animals that come through COMAS, we also recognize that our decades-old systems are over capacity and our physical facility is no longer functional.

The most fiscally responsible way forward is a modernized shelter that meets animal control laws and requirements, upholds the highest standards of care, and addresses the needs of our community.

Over the last 50 years, the state of animal welfare has continued to evolve. What was once a system built solely on animal control and impounding is now a more comprehensive, holistic system that includes lost and found (to reunite pets with families), a foster program, adoptions, outreach, and education.



In August 2021, Mobile City leadership began charting a new course to transform the way we respond to and care for the animals in our community.

A new shelter will help us continue this transformation from a facility designed with old methods and concepts for animal control and sheltering to one that maximizes our operational efficiency and provides the best experience possible for people and animals.

We hope you'll join us on this mission to build a facility that will serve our community for years to come, improving the safety, health, and welfare of the animals and people of Mobile. We're seeking visionary donors and investors to help us reach our \$5M goal.



A New Vision for Mobile Animal Services

There are thousands of pets across our City who need our help. **Our community will benefit tremendously from a modern animal facility, along with programs and processes focused on improving quality of care and creating a brighter, safer, and happier future for Mobile’s pets and their people.**

Our current animal shelter was constructed in the 1960s, and over the decades the building has deteriorated substantially. While city staff has worked to keep up with the maintenance needed to keep the building functioning, many issues are beyond repair and upkeep is no longer cost-effective.



Additionally, the capacity of the building is very limited and no longer adequate to provide the space needed for all services. The new shelter will greatly expand our footprint, so that we can adequately care for more animals, streamline our operations, and accommodate the public with a more welcoming experience.

In 2021, City leadership contracted with Jackson and Ryan, a national leader in animal sheltering, in partnership with Mobile-based architects at Clark, Geer, and Latham, to design a state-of-the-art facility that will allow COMAS to create a more positive, welcoming experience for shelter visitors. In addition to providing the space needed for future growth in animal intake, the new building will help solve the many pressing health, safety, and logistical needs that exist today.



Benefits of a New Facility

Animal Environment

Current Facility	New Facility
No noise reduction systems, leading to a loud and stressful atmosphere for employees and animals.	New floor plan and paneling will provide adequate separation between areas, as well as noise buffering.
Cats are kept solely in kennels with limited access to sunlight or open space until they are adopted.	Cats will have a dedicated catio to roam free in a more relaxed environment to meet potential adopters. They will also have access to natural sunlight via windows at the front of the building.
Dog kennels are concrete. Many are located outside or partially outside. Given that space is limited and the number of intakes far outweighs the building's capacity, dogs must often be confined in wire kennels until more space becomes available.	The new facility will include kennels designed to lower stress (via noise reduction, extra space, and better construction) to minimize noise and visibility of other dogs.
No adequate space internally for animals to play and socialize while staying at the shelter.	Multiple play yards and outdoor space will provide secure, safe, recreational areas for dogs of all sizes to help provide enrichment, exercise, and alleviate kennel stress.



Visitor & Office Space

Current Facility	New Facility
Not enough lobby space to accommodate visitor load. Visitors must routinely wait outside for appointments and to be assisted.	Adequate lobby space with seating for all visitor types.
No additional rooms or space outside the small lobby to conduct meet and greets or to answer questions and discuss potential options with people who come to the shelter for assistance.	Multiple, quiet rooms available for potential adopters to comfortably meet animals and receive counseling if they need help with their pet (such as spay/neuter vouchers, food, or surrendering their pets or a stray).
Adopters cannot walk through the shelter currently, given the layout and overcapacity.	The new shelter's design will make it easier for adopters to view animals available for adoption while minimizing noise and stress for the animals.
No space to provide for community education classes or to hold internal and external staff meetings.	Dedicated meeting rooms for community classes, stakeholder and volunteer meetings, rescue partners, trainings, and more.
Not enough office space for current employees, with existing office spaces shared by multiple people.	Adequate office space providing room for current and future staff growth.



"A new facility will provide the staff with the necessary resources to better assist the calls they receive and the animals that come through the system. So many calls come through the 311 system that are seemingly overlooked because there is not enough space for all of the abandoned animals to be housed. This leaves the animals to roam the streets, or the sick and injured are left to die, or to rely on local rescue groups which are already full."

Medical Surgical Suite

Current Facility	New Facility
No isolation areas for sick animals with ventilation and disease-control systems, nor adequate number of treatment rooms.	Modern clinic and surgical suite will accommodate all medical cases, critical care, exams, and surgeries by a licensed veterinarian. Includes separate HVAC systems to reduce disease transmission. Intakes/new admissions will be conveniently located so that animals can be transferred immediately to our medical suite to minimize any spread of disease.
No adequate space to meet community demand and need for animal medical services.	The new suite will greatly expand capacity to provide more medical services to animals in need.
No space to accommodate in-house veterinarian and medical services team.	New medical suite will allow an in-house veterinarian along with a medical team to to perform in-house spay/neuter surgeries, diagnostics, and equipment/supplies, thereby reducing the need to transport animals to outside clinics.

"COMAS is a lifeline to stray and abandoned pets in our community, and it's a facility where lost pets can be reconnected to their family. COMAS provides timely and better health care for stray and unwanted pets, which includes spaying and neutering to decrease the population. Number of Pets Served

More than **2,000** animals come through COMAS' doors and receive services annually.
